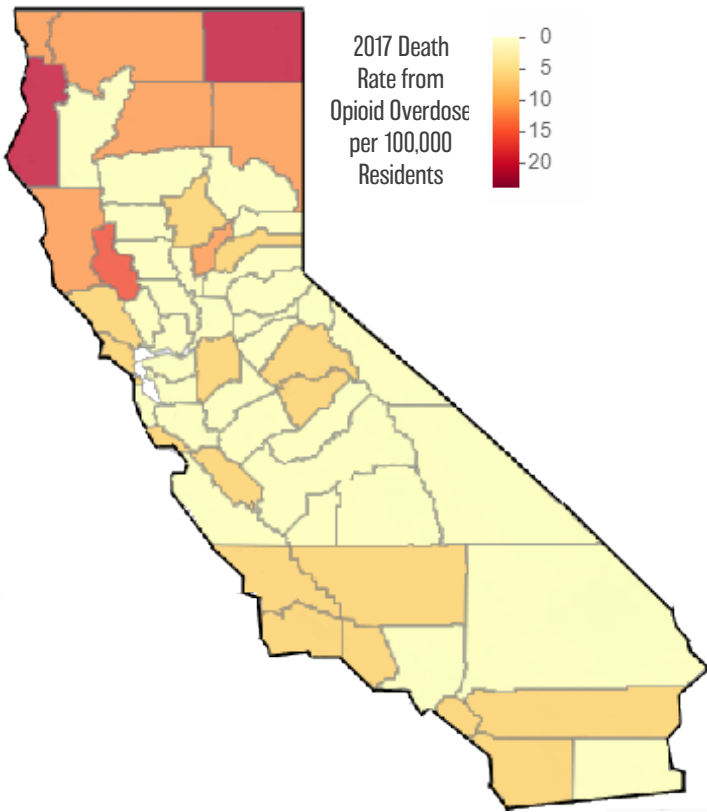




THE CALIFORNIA MEDICATION ASSISTED TREATMENT PROJECT 2.0

The California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) is pleased to announce the kick off of California’s State Opioid Response Grant funded by SAMHSA “The California Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) Project 2.0.” The Project will build upon the foundation laid by the federal Opioid State Targeted Response Grant: “The California MAT Expansion Project,” which created the California Hub & Spoke System. An estimated 270,000 individuals will benefit from this expanded project, which will run for two years beginning in September 2018.

PROJECT OBJECTIVES

- Develop additional MAT locations with a focus on rural locations
- Provide MAT access to specialized and underserved communities
- Transform entry points for individuals with opioid use disorders and create effective referrals into treatment
- Develop coordinated referral processes to manage high-risk transitions
- Engage current and potential MAT prescribers
- Enact overdose prevention activities to prevent opioid misuse and overdose deaths

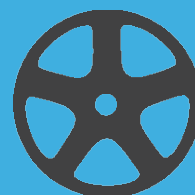
Assess and Address Tribal Needs



Expanded Tribal MAT services, including:

- Tele-MAT
- Naloxone Distribution
- Needs Assessment
- MAT Champions
- Project Echo

Full Spectrum Service Delivery Models



Add 200+ new MAT access points throughout California in: primary care, hospitals, emergency departments, medication units, jails, residential centers, tribal and urban health centers, DUI providers, and community mental health centers

MAT For Special Populations



Increase MAT access for American Indians & Alaskan Natives, perinatal, service members and veterans, and youth and families through provision of MAT services.

Prevention and Education Services



Including statewide distribution of naloxone; resources, toolkits, and technical assistance for workforce, counties, & providers; media campaign; drug take back; fentanyl reporting and education; youth-specific prevention services; and enhanced prescription drug monitoring.

DATA Waivered Providers



Increase the number of practitioners with a DATA (X) waiver to prescribe buprenorphine, including supporting new providers through academic detailing, mentoring, and coaching.

Reduce or Eliminate Costs



Eliminate or reduce treatment costs for uninsured or underinsured patients.

Address Criminal Justice Needs



Expand MAT in county justice settings and educate probation, parole, courts, and other justice partners.

High-Risk Transitions



Increase referrals into MAT at emergency departments, hospitals, primary care, and key county touchpoints.
